# Executive Summary

### Dear SAU#9 Community Members,

We are writing to update you on the Safe Return to In-Person Instruction and Continuity of Services Plan. The health and safety of our students, staff, and community continues to be our top priority. There are still many unknowns related to the pandemic and this plan is designed to respond efficiently and effectively.

Over the course of the 2020-2021 school year the Re-Entry team transitioned to become the Pandemic Response Team. The Pandemic Response Team was composed of area superintendents and heads of school, school nurses, administration, and local medical providers. Special thanks to Dr. Rich Laracy, Dr. Wenda Saunders, Julie Hill, R.N., and Dr. Charlotte Helvie for their availability and assistance at all hours of the day and night, including weekends and holidays. Each Tuesday morning, the Pandemic Response Team met to review current conditions, update protocols and procedures, and analyze the impact of COVID on each individual school.

Throughout this past year, incremental adjustments were made to the plan that were reflective of the conditions at that time. The plan was dynamic and responsive to the recommendations of the CDC (Center for Disease Control) and NHDPHS (Department of Public Health Services). The plan allowed schools within SAU #9 to provide in-person instruction throughout the year, with only a few short exceptions. We were able to withstand over 132 confirmed positive cases in our schools, while partnering with health care providers to support vaccine clinics for staff and students. Our community, staff and students should be commended for their diligence in following the recommendations and guidelines.

We acknowledge that the community would like to know exactly what to expect for the return to school in the Fall. You will find that the updated plan will continue to be dynamically responsive to the current conditions. The plan will indicate a color in which schools will be operating. Red will implement the most restrictive with protocols and procedures, yellow will maintain appropriate guidelines, and green will be least restrictive. We anticipate and will be preparing to move from one color to the next fluidly dependent upon the trending conditions presented.

We hope to build upon what we have learned over this past year and improve our practice moving forward.

### Making Indicators

The SAU#9 School Board has authorized the Superintendent of Schools to make decisions regarding the operating conditions of the school environment as it relates to the COVID-19 pandemic. After monitoring and evaluating the indicators below a decision will be made as to which operating conditions (RED, YELLOW or GREEN) the school will be under. Operating conditions will vary within each color based on how the indicators are trending (towards more restrictive or towards least restrictive).

### Responsibilities

### Parent Responsibilities

- Be aware of the current operating conditions (color) and corresponding guidance
- Prepare for potential transitions between face to face and remote instruction
- Practice hygiene and sanitization in preparation for attending school
- Prepare and properly instruct your child on how to effectively wear a mask and practice mask sanitation
- Monitor and screen health concerns including temperature and/or screening checks
- Keep your child at home and communicate with the school and your medical provider if COVID-19 symptoms are present or if the student has been exposed to someone with COVID-19 including shared household members
- Always keep your child at home when they are sick (see page 11 for details)
- Reinforce physical distancing as appropriate

### Student & Staff Responsibilities

- Be aware of the current operating conditions (color) and corresponding guidance
- Prepare for potential transitions between face to face and remote instruction
- Practice hygiene and sanitation protocols
- Wear face masks as required
- Routine cleaning of high touch surfaces including, laptops and digital devices
- Adhere to physical distance guidelines when applicable
- Monitor health symptoms and maintain health screening practices
- Stay home when sick (see page 11 for details)

# Health Check

People with COVID-19 have had a wide range of symptoms reported – ranging from mild symptoms to severe illness. Symptoms may appear 2-14 days after exposure to the virus. Anyone can have mild to severe symptoms. People with these symptoms may have COVID-19:

- Fever or chills
- Cough
- Shortness of breath or difficulty breathing
- Fatigue
- Muscle or body aches

- Headache
- New loss of taste or smell
- Sore throat
- Congestion or runny nose
- Nausea or vomiting
- Diarrhea

Whether vaccinated or unvaccinated, all students and staff must follow these actions and protocols when experiencing COVID-19 symptoms.

### **ACTION**

#### What to do:

- Stay home except to get medical care and notify the school
- Separate yourself from other people
- Monitor your symptoms
- Call ahead before visiting your doctor
- Get tested
- If you are sick, wear a mask over your nose and mouth
- Cover your coughs and sneezes
- Clean your hands often
- Avoid sharing personal household items
- Clean all "high-touch" surfaces everyday

### PROTOCOL FOR RETURN TO SCHOOL

If you test POSITIVE for COVID-19:

- 10 days since symptoms first appeared

  AND
- At least 24 hours with no fever without the use of fever-reducing medications

AND

Other symptoms of COVID-19 are improving

If you test NEGATIVE for COVID-19:

Provide negative test to school

AND

 At least 24 hours with no fever without the use of fever-reducing medications

AND

• Other symptoms are improving

### If you are <u>fully vaccinated</u> and are <u>asymptomatic</u> following exposure to COVID-19:

- CDC recommends fully vaccinated individuals get tested at the 3-5 day mark following a known exposure to COVID-19, even if no symptoms are present
- Fully vaccinated individuals may refrain from quarantine following a known exposure (see below)

### When to Quarantine:

Quarantine if you have been in close contact (within 3-6 feet of someone for a cumulative total of 15 minutes or more over a 24-hour period) with someone who has COVID-19, unless you have been fully vaccinated. People who are fully vaccinated do NOT need to quarantine after contact with someone who had COVID-19 unless they have symptoms. However, fully vaccinated people should get tested 3-5 days after their exposure, even if they don't have symptoms and wear a mask indoors in public for 14 days following exposure or until their test result is negative.

CDC Exception: In the K–12 indoor classroom setting, the close contact definition excludes students who were within 3 to 6 feet of an infected student (laboratory-confirmed or a clinically compatible illness) where both students were engaged in consistent and correct use of well-fitting masks; AND other K–12 school prevention strategies (such as universal and correct mask use, physical distancing, increased ventilation) were in place in the K–12 school setting. # Frequently Asked Questions

QUESTION	ANSWER	
Who is responsible for daily health screening?	Students and staff are responsible to complete a daily health screening. If any COVID-19 symptoms exist, individuals should stay home and families should consult with their physician.	
	Regardless of vaccination status, all individuals experiencing COVID-19 symptoms should be tested.	
What are the transportation expectations for my student?	When riding a school bus, all students are required to sit in an assigned seat and wear a mask.

When and where does my student need to wear a mask?	Masking requirements will vary depending on the school operating condition (color) determined and the evaluation of indicators. NOTE: There may be times when certain schools/classrooms may have different masking requirements based on their individual condition as determined by the Superintendent of Schools following consultation with local medical providers, NHDPHS, AAP and review of the current CDC guidance.  Accommodation requests should be directed to your

Will parents/guardians be able to come into the school?	Access to buildings will be determined based on the current school operating condition (color) coded status.

Can parents/guardians choose to have their child "remotely" educated?	No. Remote instruction will only be approved for students with special considerations for the 2021-2022 school year. Please contact your building principal if you feel your student should be considered.	

# Frequently Asked Questions

QUESTION	ANSWER
If a child is homeschooled can they participate in school activities?	Yes. If activities/sports are available, by law homeschool students are eligible to access those activities. All SAU9 COVID-19 protocols will be followed by all student participants.
What procedure will be followed if a student develops symptoms during the school day?	The student will be sent to the nurse's office for preliminary assessment. If symptomatic, the student will be moved to an isolated area to await immediate pick up. Students may return to school following 10 days with improving symptoms and no fever within 24 hours or upon receipt of a negative COVID19 test result.
Who will be considered a close contact?	A close contact is a person who has been within 3-6 feet for a cumulative total of 15 minutes or more over a 24-hour period with someone who has COVID-19, unless you have been <u>fully vaccinated</u> .
When will my student be required to quarantine?	Students wearing masks and who have been at least 3-6 feet away from a positive case will not be required to quarantine.
	Fully vaccinated students will not be required to quarantine unless they have COVID19 symptoms.
	Unvaccinated students <i>and</i> unmasked students will be required to quarantine for 10 days and be tested after being identified.
If my student is a close contact, when will my student need to be tested?	Fully vaccinated students should get tested 3-5 days after their exposure, even if they don't have symptoms. They should wear a mask indoors in public for 14 days following exposure or until they receive a negative test result.
	Unvaccinated students <i>and</i> unmasked students will be required to quarantine for 10 days and be tested after being identified.
