Yes, the plan has been presented and discussed in public meetings throughout 2020-2021 and 2021-2022. An additional public hearing on the LEA's ESSER III plan was advertised and held in December, 2021, with another public hearing scheduled for June, 2022. Additional public reports and hearings have been made on dozens of occassions, all detailed in the district's "Reopening and Use of Funds" document, posted online for public inspection.

To the extent that ESSER III funds support programs to address learning loss and to pay for PPE and environmental mitigation supplies and equipment, student surveys throughout spring, 2020 and the entire 2020-2021 school year helped informed those decisions. Student, parent, and staff feedback have informed the planning of summer enrichment programs ("programs to address learning loss") for the summer of 2022. The town budget committee and town capital planning committee have both been engaged with regards to air quality-related contstruction projects. After NH DHHS eliminated all Covid mitigation protocol recommendations, the school board did the same. The superitnendent has been directed to inform the board if DHHS reinstates any mitigation recommendations for schools.

Student feedback from 2021's summer enrichment programs helped inform the planning of summer enrichment programs ("programs to address learning loss") for the summer of 2022.

Students enjoyed non-traditional group hands-on projects during the summer of 2021, which has been an important factor in planning a wider variety of such opportunities for 2022. Parent feedback was overwhelmingly positive, and these enrichment activities are being continued through the summer of 2023, with plans to continue in the summer of 2024 as well as a sustainability plan to continue these programs after ESSER grant funding is no longer available.

iii) Description of feedback received:

All students in 2021 enrichment programs were consulted, including vast majority students with diagnosed learning disabilities. Likewise, all student-participants in the 2022 enrichment programs were surveyed (as were their parents), and the same will take place in 2023 and

beyond.

3) Widely advertised and available: Students have been interviewed in person and surveyed online. Parents have been

interviewed in person by program staff and have received online surveys. Programs have been made available to all studnets who attend Barnstead Elementary School, including

students with disabilities.

2022 helped shape programming for 2023.

2) Inclusive: Multiple surveys were conducted among all parents/guardians with very high response rates. Parents of students in 2021 and 2022

summer enrichment programs were interviewed, including a majority parents of special needs students. Surveys will be conducted after

2023 enrichment programs.

students were interviewed in person during and after the program.

4) Ongoing: Environmental mitigation has been a non-issue since January, 2022. Student and parent feedback dictated which of the enrichment

## Appendix A. ARPA Statutory Excerpt

- (e) USES OF FUNDS.—A local educational agency that receives funds under this section—
- (1) shall reserve not less than 20 percent of such funds to address learning loss through the implementation of evidence-based interventions, such as summer learning or summer enrichment, extended day, comprehensive afterschool programs, or extended school year programs, and ensure that such interventions respond to students' academic, social, and emotional needs and address the disproportionate impact of the coronavirus on the student subgroups described in section 1111(b)(2)(B)(xi) of the Elementary and Secondary Education Act of 1965 (20U.S.C. 6311(b)(2)(B)(xi)), students experiencing homelessness, and children and youth in foster care; and
  - (2) shall use the remaining funds for any of the following:
  - (A) Any activity authorized by the Elementary and Secondary Education Act of 1965.
  - (B) Any activity authorized by the Individuals with Disabilities Education Act.
  - (C) Any activity authorized by the Adult Education and Family Literacy Act.
  - (D) Any activity authorized by the Carl D. Perkins Career and Technical Education Act of 2006.
  - (E) Coordination of preparedness and response efforts of local educational agencies with State, local, Tribal, and territorial public health departments, and other relevant agencies, to improve coordinated responses among such entities to prevent, prepare for, and respond to coronavirus.
  - (F) Activities to address the unique needs of low-income children or students, children with disabilities, English learners, racial and ethnic minorities, students experiencing homelessness, and foster care youth, including how outreach and service delivery will meet the needs of each population.
  - (G) Developing and implementing procedures and systems to improve the preparedness and response efforts of local educational agencies.
  - (H) Training and professional development for staff of the local educational agency on sanitation and minimizing the spread of infectious diseases.
  - (1) Purchasing supplies to sanitize and clean the facilities of a local educational agency, including buildings operated by such agency.
  - (J) Planning for, coordinating, and implementing activities during long-term closures, including providing meals to eligible students, providing technology for online learning to all students, providing guidance for carrying out requirements under the Individuals with Disabilities Education Act and ensuring other educational services can continue to be provided consistent with all Federal, State, and local requirements.
  - (K) Purchasing educational technology (including hardware, software, and connectivity) for students who are served by the local educational agency that aids in regular and substantive educational interaction between students and their classroom instructors, including low-income students and children with disabilities, which may include assistive technology or adaptive equipment.
  - (L) Providing mental health services and supports, including through the implementation of evidence-based full-service community schools.
  - (M) Planning and implementing activities related to summer learning and supplemental afterschool programs, including providing classroom instruction or online learning during the summer months and addressing the needs of low-income students, children with disabilities, English learners, migrant students, students experiencing homelessness, and children in foster care.
  - (N) Addressing learning loss among students, including low-income students, children with disabilities, English learners, racial and ethnic minorities, students experiencing homelessness, and children and youth in foster care, of the local educational agency, including by—
  - (i) administering and using high-quality assessments that are valid and reliable, to accurately assess students' academic progress and assist educators in meeting students' academic needs, including through differentiating instruction;
  - (ii) implementing evidence-based activities to meet the comprehensive needs of students;
  - (iii) providing information and assistance to parents and families on how they can effectively support students, including in a distance learning environment; and
  - (iv) tracking student attendance and improving student engagement in distance education.
  - (O) School facility repairs and improvements to enable operation of schools to reduce risk of virus transmission and exposure to environmental health hazards, and to support student health needs.
  - (P) Inspection, testing, maintenance, repair, replacement, and upgrade projects to improve the indoor air quality in school facilities, including mechanical and non-mechanical heating, ventilation, and air
  - conditioning systems, filtering, purification and other air cleaning, fans, control systems, and window and door repair and replacement.
  - (Q) Developing strategies and implementing public health protocols including, to the greatest extent practicable, policies in line with guidance from the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention for the reopening and operation of school facilities to effectively maintain the health and safety of students, educators, and other staff.
  - (R) Other activities that are necessary to maintain the operation of and continuity of services in local educational agencies and continuing to employ existing staff of the local educational agency.


- (a) Each LEA that receives ARP ESSER funds must submit to the SEA, in such manner and within a reasonable timeline as determined by the SEA, a plan that contains any information reasonably required by the SEA. The plan, and any revisions to the plan submitted consistent with procedures established by the SEA, must describe—
  (i) The extent to which and how the funds will be used to implement prevention and mitigation strategies that are, to the greatest extent practicable, consistent with the most recent CDC guidance on reopening schools, in order to continuously and safely open and operate schools for in-person learning;
- (ii) How the LEA will use the funds it reserves under section 2001(e)(1) of the ARP Act to address the academic impact of lost instructional time through the implementation of evidence-based interventions, such as summer learning or summer enrichment, extended day, comprehensive afterschool programs, or extended school year programs;
- (iii) How the LEA will spend its remaining ARP ESSER funds consistent with section 2001(e) of the ARP Act; and
- (iv) How the LEA will ensure that the interventions it implements, including but not limited to the interventions under section 2001(e)(1) of the ARP Act to address the academic impact of lost instructional time, will respond to the academic, social, emotional, and mental health needs of all students, and particularly those students disproportionately impacted by the COVID-19 pandemic, including students from low-income families, students of color, English learners, children with disabilities, students experiencing homelessness, children in foster care, and migratory students.
- (b) In developing its ARP ESSER plan, an LEA must—
- (i) Engage in meaningful consultation—
- (A) With stakeholders, including: Students; families; school and district administrators (including special education administrators); and teachers, principals, school leaders, other educators, school staff, and their unions; and
- (B) To the extent present in or served by the LEA: Tribes; civil rights organizations (including disability rights organizations); and stakeholders representing the interests of children with disabilities, English learners, children experiencing homelessness, children in foster care, migratory students, children who are incarcerated, and other underserved students; and
- (ii) Provide the public the opportunity to provide input and take such input into account.
