#### Why is parent and family engagement important?

A synthesis of the research concluded that "the evidence is consistent, positive, and convincing: families have a major influence on their children's achievement in school and through life. When schools, families, and community groups work together to support learning, children tend to do better in school, stay in school longer, and like school more."

# What does the research show about how parent involvement in children's education affects student achievement?

Studies have found that students with involved parents, no matter what their income or background, are more likely to—

- Earn high grades and test scores, and enroll in higher-level programs;
- Pass their classes, earn credits, and be promoted;
- Attend school regularly;
- Positive attitudes and behavior:
- Greater sense of efficacy and self-esteem;
- and
- Graduate and go on to postsecondary education.

#### Goals of Parent and Family Involvement

Parents, families, and caregivers are essential partners in supporting student success. Family Engagement can support:

- Student Success
- Student Engagement and Attendance
- Immigrant and Multilingual Families
- Student Mental Health and Well-Being
- Kindergarten Readiness and Early School Success
- College and Career Pathway Success

### Part 2 | Title I and Parent Engagement

#### Title I, Part A; ESSA Section 1116

LEAs and schools receiving Title I, Part A funds are required to do the following:

- Develop a Parent and Family Engagement Policy (a)
- Reserve funds (at least 1% only if the allocation is over \$500,000) to assist schools with Parent and Family Engagement requirements (a)
- Develop a shared responsibility for a School-Parent Compact (b)
- Adhere to the Parent Involvement Requirements (c)
- Develop a shared responsibility for a School-Parent Compact (d)
- Build capacity for involvement (e)
- Provide accessibility to parents and family members opportunities to participate (f)

## Part 3 | Coordinating with Other NHED Initiatives

#### Title II, Part A

This grant is for use by paraprofessionals, teachers, principals and other school leaders.

- Fund in-house training on best practices about family engagement.
- Support PLCs about revamping family engagement in schools using datadriving decision making
- Send the paraprofessionals, teachers, principals and other school leaders to workshop or courses if the activity meets the definition of professional development.

#### Part 3 | Coordinating with Other NHED Initiatives

#### Title III, Part A

This ESEA Title also includes requirements for Family engagement.

- Use funds to provide and implement other effective activities and strategies that enhance or supplement language instruction programs for English learners, which (A) shall include parent, family, and community engagement activities;
- (B) may include strategies that serve to coordinate and align related program.

Title II, Part A, Section 3115 (c) (3) (A) (B)

### Part 3 | Coordinating with Other NHED Initiatives

#### Title IV, Part A

This section of the ESEA law contains three distinct sections. They are:

- 1. Safe and Healthy Schools
- 2. Well-rounded education
- 3. Effective Use of Technology
- The Safe and Healthy Schools section deals with areas such as school culture and can funds activities with involving the families.
- ❖ Family and Community members are also welcome and encouraged to be part of the required stakeholder committee

### Part 4 | Activity Examples

#### Family Engagement Event Examples:

- Back to School BBQ with tour of classrooms
- Current events like the upcoming eclipse!
- Author visits
- Science/STEM events
- Gallery walks of student work
- Kindergarten Readiness events
- Grandparent Club for addressing attendance
- Student recognition dinner with the principal

## Part 4 | Activity Examples

#### Allowable Expenses:

- Workshops for Title I families/parents
- Creating a school-parent newsletter, handbook, or website
- Staff-parent book clubs on educationally related subjects
- Partnerships with cultural institutions
- Creation of a parent resource room or lending library
- Joint staff-parent professional development seminars
- Reasonable expenditures for light refreshments or food, particularly when parent involvement activities extend through mealtime
