Only one person per district should complete the form. At this time, there is no guarantee that the glasses will be made available through NHED.

- Adequate Public Education, Input Based Accountability System (IBAS) data collection is due by Jan. 15 for all schools. The survey may be found in ESSP.
- Women In Stem <u>scholarships</u> are available through **Women's Transportation Seminar** New Hampshire. This opportunity is open to current and past high school students from New Hampshire, as well as college students currently studying in the state.
- Limited in-person seats for groups of up to 25 students and unlimited virtual seats are still available for the <u>National Presidential Youth Convention</u> to NH high school students and now offered to eighth-grade middle school students. The convention is from 8:30-11:30 a.m. on Jan. 11 at the <u>AUDI</u> in Concord. Transportation assistance is available.
- As part of **National School Choice Week**, a <u>school fair</u> will be held from 11 a.m. to 2 p.m. on Jan. 27 at Southern New Hampshire University, 2500 North River Rd. in Manchester. The public is invited to attend.
- NHED is sponsoring a research project on student wellbeing and play in public elementary schools with child development researchers in the Boston College School of Social Work. The aim of the research project is to implement and evaluate two no-cost, school-based programs, Let Grow and Play Club, during the 2023-2024 academic year. The research will also measure student social, emotional and cognitive development.
