- This week, NHED released its newest cost per pupil data for the 2021-2022 school year. The
 new statewide average cost per pupil of \$19,400 is a 5.2 percent increase from the prior year.

- NHED has partnered with Learning Blade, a system of interactive online student lessons, teacher lesson plans and project-based activities for students in grades 5-9 focusing on high-demand STEM, CTE and computer science careers while reviewing academics. Students may use more than 400 online lessons aligned to state standards, allowing students to explore exciting careers. Teachers have access to dozens of lesson plans that support innovative, project-based learning and classroom activities.  EDies committee was established to provide a process that honors exemplary practices and
 excellence at Granite State schools. The application process will help school teams engage in
 a collaborative and self-reflective dialogue focused on continuous improvement and
 excellence in education. The winning school at each level will receive statewide recognition as
 the EDies School of Excellence, \$2,000, a school banner and an engraved school bell.

- New Hampshire schools are invited to apply for Cohort II of the NHED-sponsored TeachUNITED program. This program is designed to assist schools in executing shifts toward better models of teaching and learning by building capacity, not dependency. Cohort II schools must meet one or more of the following: a) rural school; or b) underserved school; or c) designated as an Additional Targeted Support and Improvement school (ATSI). Program outcomes include preparing and retaining valuable teaching staff while bringing about meaningful change in classroom practice and improving achievement for all students.
