- Following pace with general trends across much of the country, New Hampshire's student enrollment continues to shrink marking a steady, downward trend for more than two decades. This week, NHED released its statewide student enrollment numbers for the fall of 2023. At the start of the current 2023-2024 academic year, 165,095 students were officially enrolled in New Hampshire public and public charter schools. Learn more here.
- NHED has released its suggested school calendar for the 2024-2025 academic year.
- Adequate Education Grant Estimates have been released; for 2025, the base per pupil rate is \$4,182 per Average Daily Membership. The Bureau of School Finance will be hosting an Office Hours at noon on Nov. 28 to run through the adequacy calculation and answer questions; register here. A separate training video is available here.
- As part of the state accountability system, all public schools are required to complete the IBAS (Input Based Accountability System) data collection. NHED will be collecting this information via a new system, ESSP (Education and Student Success Platform). <u>Learn more</u>.
- New Hampshire educators and residents are invited to a <u>film screening</u> of the documentary
 Chasing Childhood, which will include a panel discussion and Q/A session at 6 p.m. Nov. 28 at
 Concord High School. The film examines the importance of free play and unstructured time
- Registration will remain open until Nov. 30 for round three of the Security Action for Education (SAFE) grant. This \$10 million grant is funded by Public School Infrastructure money and is available to district and chartered public schools. Schools may register here.
- Student Voices: Anxious Nation Documentary and the Anxiety Epidemic event will convene
 Dec. 4 at the Grappone Conference Center. This <u>event</u> is free for all students and their
 teachers on behalf of NHASP and NHASEA.
- The New Hampshire Excellence in Education (EDies) Awards was established to honor exemplary practices and excellence at the elementary, middle, K-8 and high school levels throughout the Granite State. Apply to be a <u>School of Excellence</u>. The Intent to Apply deadline is Dec. 22.

- The <u>Doris Barnes Retired Educator Lifetime Achievement Award</u> was created to honor a retired teacher or teachers who have continued to work with youth and the betterment of public education after their retirement. Doris was a founding member of the EDies board. The deadline to nominate is Feb. 1.
- DHHS has launched a new, statewide public awareness campaign for behavioral health and
 access to services. Strong As Granite provides a sense of hope and connectedness, reinforcing
 that mental health and substance use challenges can affect anyone, and ensuring everyone in
 New Hampshire is aware of the resources available to them.
- NHED is sponsoring a research project on student wellbeing and play in public elementary schools with child development researchers in the Boston College School of Social Work. The aim of the research project is to implement and evaluate two no-cost, school-based programs, Let Grow and Play Club, during the 2023-2024 academic year. - The NH State Fire Marshal's Office is exploring a grant opportunity for the installation of carbon monoxide alarms, at no charge, to include school buildings.
