- The State of New Hampshire, Business and Economic Affairs would like to inform you of their broadband effort as it relates to the National Telecommunications and Information Administration, Broadband Equity Access and Deployment (BEAD) program. BEA is coordinating efforts to apply for their federal BEAD allocation of \$196,560,278.97. BEA's work

will consist of developing multiple documents for NTIA to review and approve the funding allocation. NTIA and BEA's work will be to develop opportunities to close the digital divide for all residents and businesses in the state. - The Children's Literacy Foundation (CLiF)is currently accepting applications for its 2024-2025 Year of the Book Grant, which provides \$25,000 worth of new books, literacy programs, author visits, and more with the goal of building a culture of literacy in a school community. Open to preK-6 public schools in Vermont and New Hampshire with at least 35% free/reduced lunch and at least 30% of students scoring below proficient on reading/writing assessments. Applications are due March 15, 2024; more details here.
- "Outside Our Minds," a <u>Showcase AI international competition</u>, is available to students under the age of 20. It is designed to spark <u>AI-inspired creativity</u> while still recognizing some of the important foundational aspects of modern society such as arts and culture. The competition encourages students to use AI as tools to create something such as artwork, a song, video game, poem or more.
- NHED is sponsoring a research project on student wellbeing and play in public elementary schools with child development researchers in the Boston College School of Social Work. The aim of the research project is to implement and evaluate two no-cost, school-based programs, <a href="Let Grow">Let Grow</a> and <a href="Play Club">Play Club</a>, during the 2023-2024 academic year. The research will also measure student social, emotional and cognitive development.
