- A huge shoutout to all of our New Hampshire Principals on <u>School Principals' Day</u>, which is May 1. We thank you for your leadership, inspiration and guiding force.
- Gov. Sununu recently issued a proclamation recognizing April 2023 as Genocide Awareness
 Month to appropriately commemorate the victims of genocides and educate the public about
 the importance of preventing intolerance, bigotry, antisemitism, and national, ethnic, racial
 and religious hatred and genocide against any group of people. Here is a <u>letter</u> from Brian
 Balke of the Holocaust and Genocide Education Commission, which highlights ways for
 schools to address this topic.
- May 3 is National Bike & Roll to School Day, which is designed to increase the use of nonmotorized modes of transportation. More information is available here.
- Tutor.com is hosting an <u>Ice Cream Throwdown Sundae Funday</u>, and will provide a NH school
 with the greatest participation rate of live tutoring sessions or writing submissions (from May
 1-26) with an ice cream party during the first week of June.
- VR New Hampshire and White Mountains Community College are hosting a <u>Level Up and Find Your Path</u> event at 4:30 p.m. June 1 at White Mountains Community College, which includes a campus tour, exhibitors and more.
- A new school safety-related funding opportunity has been added to the <u>Grants Finder Tool</u> at SchoolSafety.gov. The **Youth Violence Prevention Program** will develop and enhance strategies to prevent youth violence, including youth gang or group violence. Deliverables from this program include the development of new direct service programs or the enhancement of existing programs for youth with multiple risk factors for violence. The Department of Justice will be holding an informational <u>webinar</u> at 2 p.m. on May 18.
- The Nashua School District is offering a screening of the *Right to Read* film at 4 p.m. on May 1 at Nashua High School North. A short panel discussion will follow the screening. Please share with colleagues and sign up here.
- The FBI Boston Field Office, in coordination with the FBI's Criminal Investigative Division, the
 Office of Private Sector and the National Center for Missing & Exploited Children has
 prepared this <u>informational sheet</u> regarding an increase in **sextortion scams** targeting

children and teens. School partners are invited to share this information with staff and students.

- City Year New Hampshire is a great opportunity for high school seniors, who may apply by
 May 5. In City Year, 17-25 year-olds complete a year of service (fulltime or 25 hours per week)
 in elementary or middle schools as a tutor and role model. The AmeriCorps Members receive
 a living stipend, education award, support applying for college and extensive training and
 leadership development. City Year is a good fit for students who are undecided, especially
 those interested in education careers or social justice; students are also able to defer. Learn more.
- The New Hampshire <u>Assistive Technology Expo</u> will take place from noon to 5 p.m. on May 10 at 25 Hall St. in Concord. Meet with assistive technology companies and specialists to learn more about their products and services.
- NHED and 321 Insight will host the last series of in-person professional development for the school year on May 16-18. The focus will be on trauma-informed practices and classroom proven strategies to address challenging behavior.  dangers of fentanyl and its presence in fake pills and other illicit substances. A toolkit is now

 educate our youth that there is "No Safe Experience" when it comes to using illicit
