# **LEGISLATIVE ACTIVITY**

Senate Health, Education and Human Services Committee heard testimony on S.B. 221, which is the language that the Commission endorsed for technical changes to our higher education and career schools legislation. The proposed changes were well received and the bill was supported unanimously by the Committee and sent to the Senate for action. We will now track progress and keep the Commission informed.

The Joint Legislative Committee on Administrative Rules reviewed the Hedc 300 Administrative Rules pertaining to the Career Schools. They took them up at the January 17, 2014 meeting of the Committee, but decided to "continue" them until the February 7, 2014 meeting of the Committee so they can see if the companion legislation, S.B 221, seems to be going forward without any opposition.

The Director provided testimony to the House Education Committee on HB 1377, a bill that proposed to amend the higher education legislation to provide that career schools may seek degree granting approval if they come before the Higher Education Commission. The Director testified in opposition to the bill on the grounds that it is unnecessary. The existing laws already provide this avenue for degree granting authority and the InterCoast College and Career Institute in Salem, NH has been so approved. We await the Committee's action on the bill.

# STAFF DEVELOPMENT/OFFICE ISSUES/OTHER

The Governor and Council confirmed the appointment of Dr. Edward MacKay as the new Director of the Division of Higher Education – Higher Education Commission on January 29, 2014. He will assume his responsibilities on Wednesday, February 12, 2014.

Ms. Amy Slattery has left her position in the Division of Higher Education for a position in the Department of Revenue Administration. She was helpful with a smooth transition and we have posted the position to see if we can recruit a replacement. The Division has enough College Access Challenge Grant (CACG) funding remaining to carry the position at least through the summer of 2014.

Mr. Thomas Horgan, Executive Director of the NHCUC, has submitted the nomination of Dr. Stephen Jones, president of Antioch New England, to fill the private college vacancy on the Commission created by the retirement of Roger Williams, president of NHIA.

On a related matter, the Memorandum of Agreement between the Division of Higher Education and the Department of the Treasury for services provided for the UNIQUE Program has been completed and signed. The Division has invoiced Treasury for the annual transfer of \$36,000 in consideration for the services provided.

# **COLLEGE AND UNIVERSITY ACTIVITY**

## **State Authorization Reciprocity Agreement (SARA):**

There has been no additional activity with SARA since our meeting with the New England Board of Higher Education (NEBHE) in December. The states of Connecticut and Massachusetts have sent a joint letter to the NEBHE to express their concern that if the SARA Agreement, as currently written, is adopted, it would mean that they (CT & MA) would have to accept the online programs from institutions in a number of states that are not regionally accredited. They are asking NEBHE to carry this concern to the SARA National Council.

Michael Thomas will be briefing Ed MacKay on SARA via conference call on February 7, 2014.

As I stated in earlier reports, the rollout of SARA will not be without serious concerns being addressed.

**Southern New Hampshire University (SNHU)** – Bachelor of Science in Nursing and Master of Science in Nursing - the Commission on Collegiate Nursing Education (CCNE) conducted its first comprehensive evaluation of the online nursing programs at SNHU on January 13 - 15, 2014. The visit was observed for the Commission by Dr. Sharon George, Dean of Nursing at Saint Anselm College. Her report is included with the package of materials for the Commission. The Commission will receive the final CCNE report

and recommendations when they are available this summer. Following this report, the Commission will then decide its timetable for continued review of the SNHU program.

**Franklin Pierce University**: We have been informed that Franklin Pierce University will be phasing out four undergraduate majors in American Studies, Theatre & Dance, Graphic Communications, Fine Arts, Mathematics, and Arts Management.

# **COLLEGE ACCESS CHALLENGE GRANT (CACG)**

- The amount of \$52,000 was approved by the Governor and Council on January 29, 2014. This extension was funded by residual funds from CACG and will be the CACG funds available for this successful project. CACG funding will cease on June 30, 2014.
- The New Hampshire Scholars project continues to function very well and is now focused on bringing several career and technical centers into the program. The program is funded from a variety of sources for the current fiscal year, including \$25,000 from CACG. CACG support will be complete on June 30, 2014.
- Once the Division fills the position vacated by Amy Slattery, the new staff person will focus a portion of his/her attention on closing out the CACG grant activity.
- Data on the UNIQUE Scholarship awards for the 2013-14 academic year have been gathered and analyzed. These data will go to the UNIQUE Commission on February 10, 2014 to assist them in establishing the parameters for the annual awards for 2014-15.

# <u>Career School Licensing</u> Submitted by Kimberly J. Kenneally

The Career School Licensing function continues its performance as required by RSA 188-G:1-10.

As of January 27, 2014:

- Effective June 30, 2013, S.B. 162 repealed RSA 188-G:4 the Student Tuition Guaranty Fund. The fund has returned \$402,575.07 to the contributing career schools.
- Hedc 300 Rules have been tabled at JLCAR, until February 7, 2014.
- The Salter School of Nursing and Allied Health, Surgical Technology program, has remained an
  ongoing concern. This office has worked diligently to assist the students in obtaining suitable
  clinical sites, for their externships.
- InterCoast Career School programs; HVAC Technology, Electrical, and Drug and Alcohol/Substance Abuse have been brought to the attention of this office. Partnered with Veterans Education Services, we have participated in two site visits, at the request of students, and continue communication with the administrators of the facility.
- Currently there are eighty five (85) licensed career schools in the State of New Hampshire.
- Twenty one (21) renewal applications are pending review.
