What is career and technical education?

Career and technical education (CTE) provides students with the **academic, technical, and employability skills and knowledge** to pursue a career, postsecondary training, or higher education. CTE programs address the skills needed in specific career pathways and are aligned to high academic standards and postsecondary expectations. CTE uses applied, contextual learning to help students see the relevance of what they are learning and its connection to career opportunities and life goals.

How can homeschooled students access CTE?



Homeschooled students in New Hampshire can attend one of the 28 regional CTE centers in the state, which provide students the opportunity to access a variety of career and technical education pathways. Students may apply to attend a CTE center after completing the equivalent of one year of high school.



How can students get to CTE centers? The school district that a homeschooled student lives in is responsible for providing transportation to and from the CTE center, or for reimbursing parents for the cost of transportation. In some cases, students may be able to drive themselves to CTE centers.



What does it cost? Costs for attending the CTE center are paid for the district that a homeschooled student lives in.
