New Hampshire Teacher of the Year

Each year, since 1952, New Hampshire schools have taken part in the State and National Teacher of the Year program. Educators are selected from any New Hampshire state-approved or accredited school, pre-kindergarten through grade 12, if they are planning to continue in an active teaching status. The purpose of the program is to select a teacher who is capable of speaking for and energizing the teaching profession, and representing the positive contributions of all teachers statewide. The Teacher of the Year serves as a leader and ambassador for all the outstanding teachers devoted to the highest level of student learning. This individual has the respect and admiration of their colleagues, as well as:

- Is an expert in their field who guides students of all backgrounds and abilities to achieve excellence
- Collaborates with colleagues, students and families to create a school culture of respect and success
- Deliberately connects the classroom and key stakeholders to foster a strong community at large
- Demonstrates leadership and innovation inside and outside of the classroom walls that embodies lifelong learning

Elizabeth Duclos was chosen as New Hampshire's 2024 Teacher of the Year for her incredible work ethic, insightful thinking, expertise in education and ongoing work to ensure that each student receives the support they deserve to succeed.

Duclos is a third-grade teacher at Pembroke Hill School, which serves students in preschool through fourth-grade in Pembroke. She has been an educator for 16 years, teaching grades one through four in public and private schools throughout her tenure.

New Hampshire is lucky to have an engaging educator who is devoted to creating young learners who feel their work has both meaning and importance. Duclos is committed to creating and delivering instruction that meets students where they are, challenges them to try their best and empowers them to grow as learners and individuals.

Duclos holds a Bachelor of Science degree in Family Studies from the University of New Hampshire and a Master's of Education degree in Elementary Education from the University of New Hampshire. She also completed a certificate program from Plymouth State University earning a certification as a K-12 Reading and Writing Specialist. Presidential Award for Excellence in Mathematics and Science Teaching (PAEMST)

The PAEMST is administered by the National Science Foundation (NSF) on behalf of the White House. Established by Congress in 1983, the Presidential Awards are the nation's highest honors for teachers of mathematics and science. As New Hampshire state finalists, these recipients are now in the running to be selected at the national level.

The award recognizes outstanding K-12 teachers for their contributions in the classroom and to their profession, as well as acknowledges educators who are models in both their classrooms and in their communities. In addition this award provides positive examples for peers and students alike. The teachers receiving these awards are recognized for greatly improving their students' understanding in science , engineering, mathematics, and computer science for exemplary teaching, and for demonstrating educational goals that help them maintain positions of professional leadership. The goal of the program is to encourage highly capable individuals to enter and remain in the STEM teaching field.

The competition alternates each year between teachers of grades K-6 and grades 7-12. After an initial selection process at the state level, a national panel of distinguished scientists, mathematicians, and educators recommends teachers to receive a national PAEMST award. Winners at the national level receive a \$10,000 award from the NSF, as well as a trip for two to Washington, D.C., for a week of professional development activities and celebratory events.

Joanne Goelzer, is an experienced educator with more than thirty years in teaching, specializing in earth and physical science, at CoeBrown Northwood Academy. Her colleagues and community respect her for dedication to the students and their learning, her mastery of the content, her use of effective instructional practices, and for her lifelong desire to learn and explore new topics. Beyond the school day, her passion for science and science education has found, Joanne serving on the NH Department of Education's Professional Standards Board, holding multiple roles on the NH Science Teachers' Association Board, and in serving through WebbAlign as a panelist and facilitator of assessment evaluation.

Karen McCallion, has over 17 years of teaching experience in science at Epping Middle/High School. Here, Karen is recognized as a dedicated teacher, well versed not only in her teaching to a diverse range of students, but also for being well-versed in curriculum design with incorporated tiered support and universal interventions to support students in their learning. Beyond the classroom, Karen collaborated with others in her district in creating authentic performance assessments within the PACE pilot program.

Sandra Swiechowicz is the sole integrated computer science teacher at Raymond High School. With two decades of experience, Sandra is known for her dedication and commitment to her students and school community. She is also known for her strong work ethic, being a critical thinker, and in having a strong foundation in all academic areas, including career-ready technical skills. Along with her work at Raymond High School, Sandra has participated in a state-wide committee through the NHED in looking at Work Study Practices for the state, participated on a NHED and NEASC reaccreditation committee, and in the Marine Corps Educators' Workshop.



Blue Ribbon Schools

Since 2002, schools singled out for national honors will now reflect the goals of our nation's new education reforms for high standards and accountability. The No Child Left Be-

hind—Blue Ribbon Schools Program honors public and private K-12 schools that are either academically superior in their state or that demonstrate dramatic gains in student achievement.

2023 National Blue Ribbon Schools

New Hampshire is pleased to announce its 2023 National Blue Ribbon Schools. The U.S. Department of Education describes the common threads of each school:

National Blue Ribbon School leaders articulate a vision of excellence and hold everyone to high standards. They demonstrate effective and innovative teaching and learning, and the schools value and support teachers and staff through meaningful professional learning. Data from many sources are used to drive instruction and every student strives for success. Families, communities, and educators work together toward common goals. What is true nationally is also true for New Hampshire, and the three awardees for 2023 truly shine across any metric against which a school could be measured.

The mission of the Department of Education is to provide educational leadership and services that promote equal educational opportunities and quality practices and programs that enable New Hampshire residents to become fully productive members of society

Mary C. Dondero School, led by Mrs. Katherine Callahan, has a 73% rate of proficiency in reading, and a 63% proficiency rate in math. It is a school that fosters kindness and respect both within its walls and out into the community. The families are deeply connected to the work and goals of the students, and the students in turn connect and communicate with each other. All value open-minds and hard work.

Riddle Brook School, led by Mrs. Molly McCarthy, has an 84% proficiency rate in reading and an 88% proficiency rate in math. The school seeks to reach out to the wider community, holding itself and its students accountable for learning together, being respectful and safe, and taking the risk to be inspired. This school truly opens its arms to all students, welcoming back its graduating seniors for a huge round of applause in June and keeping students with special needs with grade-level peers as much as possible throughout the day.

Rye Elementary School, led by Mrs. Michelle Pitts, has a reading proficiency rate of 85%, and a math proficiency rate of 82%. The school builds an environment of learners who develop as individuals, in groups, and as a part of the larger world. The focus of this engaged school is broad as well as personalized, helping students to dig into problems without giving up while helping them to care for each other and the environment.

New Hampshire is grateful for the hard work of these and all of its schools, and it is an honor and affirm the Blue Ribbon Schools' exemplary high-performing status.
