

# **ESSA School Identification**

## Background

Under the Every Student Succeeds Act (ESSA), states are required to develop an accountability system and identify schools in need of the most support. This guidance provides information on the school identification process and criteria. In Fall 2022, New Hampshire Department of Education (NHED) will fully resume school identification after a two-year hiatus caused by the COVID-19 pandemic.

## **Types of Schools Identified under ESSA**

The following table explains three types of schools identified under ESSA.

Identification Frequency	Every 3 years	Every year	Every 3 years
Exit Criteria (Fall 2022)	<ul> <li>Schools identified in 2018 exit in 2022 if they:</li> <li>Exceed 2018 indicator cut scores and demonstrate improvement from the school's 2018 scores; <u>AND</u></li> <li>Not in the lowest performing 5% Title I schools identified in 2022</li> </ul>	No separate exit criteria as TSI schools are identified annually	<ul> <li>Schools identified in 2018 exit in 2022 if they:</li> <li>Exceed 2018 indicator cut scores and demonstrate improvement from the school's 2018 scores for the identified subgroup(s)</li> </ul>

\*NOTE: There will be a one-time, consecutive identification in Fall 2022 and 2023 to ensure accurate identification of schools requiring additional support. Data from SY 19-20 and 20-21 will not count towards school identification in 2022. For more information, see <u>this guide</u> on the 2022 changes to the ESSA State Plan.

#### What Happens after a School is Identified?

NHED will contact identified schools in Fall 2022 to inform them of the selection and next steps including how to access the available resources to improve their status. Schools will be required to work with their district leadership to establish an improvement plan. Demonstration of progress will be examined by NHED.
